Women's Health and Obesity

Obesity impacts women and men differently. Here are some things you should know about the overall impact of excess weight and obesity on women's health throughout a lifetime.

Obesity in women is associated with numerous comorbid conditions.

Obesity is a treatable, chronic disease, with nearly 250 associated conditions and comorbidities. Women living with excess weight or obesity are more likely to develop many of these comorbidities including diabetes, cardiovascular disease and hypertension. They also live with increased odds of experiencing major depression related to their weight.

Women are also more at risk for 13 different kinds of cancer that have been linked to obesity: breast, colon and rectal, endometrial, gallbladder, stomach, esophagus (throat), liver, kidney, meningioma (cancer of the tissue that covers the brain and spinal cord), multiple myeloma (cancer of blood plasma cells), pancreatic, ovarian, and thyroid cancers.



Obesity disproportionately impacts women of color.

More than two thirds of women in the US live with excess weight or obesity, but the highest rates - approximately 4 out of 5 – are within the African American community, followed by 78.8% of Hispanic American women. Adiposity around the waist may contribute more to chronic illness and associated health risks than overall BMI. This is where African American women tend to carry excess weight starting in adolescence. A study of racial differences found that black females had significantly higher waist circumference at all ages than white adolescent females.

Maternal obesity contributes to increased maternal mortality and complications.

Obesity and excess weight increase the risk of maternal mortality by 1.6, and that risk more than triples for women with severe obesity. Not only does obesity often present challenges in conceiving due to irregular menstrual cycles and polycystic ovary syndrome, but excess weight may also cause many complications throughout pregnancy and delivery. Obesity puts a woman at risk for developing gestational hypertension, preeclampsia, gestational diabetes, and obstructive sleep apnea. The disease of obesity also increases the risk of birth defects, preterm birth, and stillbirth.
